Had I come to the LGH sooner, I would not have lost my kidney

Pierre Karasarkissian, an Armenian from Syria and his wife Mary, have been living in Pierrefonds for the past 45 years and are a close-knit couple. Mary regularly completes Pierre's sentences, while he makes her smile with his caustic sense of humour. He speaks five languages, is a mechanic and has worked practically his entire life with his brother at the family garage on Gouin Boulevard.

Suddenly, his life was turned upside down! To survive, he had to start dialysis treatments that would last four years.

In 2011, Pierre went to a downtown hospital to meet a nephrologist. He didn't feel any particular discomfort, but his blood pressure was abnormally high: 200 over 96. And yet... "They didn't do anything for me. I was simply dismissed and sent back home without further consideration."

A year later, his condition worsened. His blood pressure was sky-high, so Pierre returned to the hospital, but this time to the Lakeshore General Hospital (LGH). Blood tests revealed dangerously high levels of potassium and creatinine. Dr. Bounatiro, nephrologist, alerted him that his kidneys were only working at 15% of their capacity. Pierre had waited too long and needed immediate dialysis.

"It was the worst day of our lives as a couple, and it happened the day before my wife's birthday," recalls Pierre. Suddenly, his life was turned upside down! To survive, he had to start dialysis treatments that would last four years. In order to receive his dialysis, a semi-permanent catheter had to be installed in his chest. This procedure, which had to be repeated several times, required a special trip to a downtown hospital, accompanied by a LGH nurse. Each time, he lost an entire day's work.

Pierre and Mary went to the LGH three times per week for dialysis treatments that lasted five hours! His treating physicians were Drs. Bounatiro and Loertscher. "We have a membership at the LGH," said Pierre half-smiling. "The entire staff from the Hemodialysis Department knows us, the hospital is amazing, the nurses are wonderful and they are fun too! At each visit, we brought food, sweets, and we even wheeled-in crates of fresh fruit."

Being on a waiting list for a kidney transplant, the long-awaited day arrived in March 2016, on Easter weekend. A new kidney had been found for him! The first one was incompatible, but the second one arrived three weeks later and was a perfect match.

A small blockage in the new kidney meant surgery by Dr. Aris, who now uses the new Multifunctional Radiology Room. Today, Pierre lives his life fully and enjoys being with his three children and his five grandchildren. He likes to tease that Mary keeps him busy.

"High blood pressure is a silent killer, my condition was considered critical... had I come to the LGH sooner, I would not have lost my kidney. It was our community hospital that kept me alive. The LGH and all its staff are fantastic and I am very grateful to them."

The Multifunctional Radiology Room Two Years in Operation



It was in July 2017 that the LGH's Multifunctional Radiology Room was inaugurated thanks to your donations. This stateof-the-art facility includes specialized high-level diagnostic equipment that offers a less invasive alternative to conventional surgical procedures. Most important is the

fact that patients can benefit from shorter procedures and a much quicker recovery.

Thanks to this room, the LGH is able to offer services which were previously only available downtown. Now, there is no need to go elsewhere. For example, inpatients on hemodialysis don't have to be transferred and accompanied by a nurse to a hospital downtown for a semi-permanent catheter insertion. As Pierre indicates on page 1, this procedure used to take a full day. It is now performed within an hour! Also performed on the spot is the installation of the vascular access for cancer patients, which is now done on-site. "It is very touching to see how happy patients are about receiving care in their community, close to home, surrounded by their families, without having to worry about transportation. This is a great timesaver and above all, less stress for patients", says Véronique Rodella, Medical Imaging Manager.

The Multifunctional Radiology Room has allowed 18% more procedures to take place in our Hospital!

A Glimpse at Our Heritage

One of the first Chairs of the LGH Board of Directors, who inaugurated the hospital in May 1965, was Clarence S. Campbell. He is best known as President of the National Hockey League (from 1946 to 1977). A trophy in his honour has been awarded annually in the NHL since 1968. Many remember him as the one who suspended Maurice "Rocket" Richard. His notoriety and his network greatly helped the fundraising efforts that allowed the construction of the Hospital.

Thank you to Alain Carette, who retired March 31st after a long career at the LGH, and who generously shared his passion and interest for archives.
