Life after death

Saint-Lazare resident survives massive heart attack

arry Day died twice. There was no bright light; his life didn't flash before his eyes. In fact, he doesn't remember a darn thing.

Mr. Day "died" in mid-December 2009, a few days before his 52nd birthday. He wasn't feeling well and went downstairs for a glass of water. Thankfully his wife Jayne followed.

Sitting at the kitchen table reaching for a cigarette, Mr. Day said, "Getting old sucks!" As if on cue, he collapsed. At first his wife thought he was joking except for the fact he was turning *Smurf* blue. She dialed 911 and started CPR.

"Jayne stayed cool. She saved my life," says Mr. Day. His advice to husbands: "Don't ever let your wife save your life. I am now screwed. I will never win another argument in my life!" he says with a laugh.

Seriously though, Mr. Day implores everyone to learn CPR. "Take a course. You never know when you might be called upon to save a life."

Speaking of saving lives, the ambulance technicians used a defibrillator three times to restart his heart and then rushed him to the Lakeshore General Hospital (LGH). They jolted him again in the ambulance essentially bringing him back to life twice.

The diagnosis, his left anterior descending artery was 95% blocked. As far as heart attacks go, this is the big one. It's nicknamed the *Widow Maker*. Most sufferers don't make it to the hospital alive.

The Saint-Lazare resident was rushed to an operating room where surgeons installed three stents. Mr. Day woke up in the LGH Intensive Care Unit.

"I was a terrible patient. I was swearing like crazy and demanding to go home," he recalls. But his foul mood didn't perturb the health team. Mr. Day says his cardiologist Dr. Franco Sandrin and the entire nursing team were "absolutely terrific — incredibly caring, friendly and attentive."

Three days after surgery, on his birthday, Mr. Day went home.

Today, Mr. Day, a radio, television and film personality is doing well. "I used to love smoking, really loved it. My wife has told me in no uncertain terms, she saved my life once and will take it away if I ever light up again!" One thing is certain, Mr. Day's sense of humour has also made a full recovery.

What a terrific year! In January, thanks to donations from the incredible members of the West Island community, we inaugurated four new Intensive Care rooms. Then in July, we cut the ribbon officially opening a state-of-the-art Multifunctional Radiology Room.

This new room is a remarkable achievement and a reflection of our community's tremendous support and profound attachment to the Lakeshore General Hospital. The room is home to cutting-edge technology including specialized diagnostic equipment, which facilitates image guided procedures with the Artis Zee MP imaging system from Siemens.

The system allows patients to receive the highest quality of care close to home. They will no longer need to be transferred or to travel downtown for procedures. The new technology can also provide an alternative to conventional or 'open' surgery, which for patients means shorter wait times, a faster, less painful recovery and fewer days spent in the hospital. It will have an immediate and profound impact on several departments, namely: surgery, nephrology, oncology, emergency and obstetrics.

Projects like this give full meaning to our mission and reaffirm our sense of purpose. We wish to express our gratitude to the community and in particular to the Eric T. Webster Foundation for their vision and for providing immeasurable support every step of the way. Without them, this project would not have seen the light of day.

New Multifunctional Radiology Room will significantly impact patient care

As the population on the West Island expands, more and more residents are counting on the Lakeshore General Hospital for vital, lifesaving care. To meet the community's growing needs, the hospital opened a high-tech Multifunctional Radiology Room, with the Lakeshore General Hospital Foundation's financial support.

"This is a critical investment as the new technology is enhancing care provided to patients across all medical and surgical disciplines," says Dr. Fadi Aris, Chief of the Medical Imaging Department and the driving force behind this project. "We can now provide minimally invasive procedures under image quidance. This will reduce the length of hospitalization for surgical patients and decrease the rate of complications."

For patients who have had a kidney transplant or who are suffering from kidney stones, physicians can now more easily relieve blockages of the urinary tracts due to stones and scarring.

For those living with cancer, time will be saved in diagnosing and staging the disease by providing timely biopsies to complement the

hospital's full-diagnostic imaging capabilities. In addition, doctors will be able to install and care for the vascular access required for chemotherapy.

"The spectrum of care this technology can offer is endless and will be tailored to the needs of our community," says Dr. Aris. "I look forward to putting this technology to the service of our patients and to continue improving care for residents of the West Island." •


developed a loyal clientele. For many years, Joe took care of his wife as her health deteriorated. Sadly, Winifred passed away in 2015.

Giving back is key

Several years ago, Joe embarked on a new 'career', he started volunteering. He enjoys giving back to his community, because throughout his life, people have helped and supported him. "You have got to reciprocate," he says.

In 1989, Joe helped raise \$20,000, when he was President of the Rotary Club of Montreal-Lakeshore. It was the Rotary Club who suggested he volunteer for the annual Duck Race. In 2005, he presented a \$5,000 donation to another charity, funds he had raised in celebration of his 80th birthday.

This toe-tapping, joke-telling, ladies' man is known to break out in song to coax you into smiling. He encourages everyone, no matter their age, to volunteer. "You are never too old to help others," he says.
